Assistance with animal welfare issues



The NSW Department of Primary Industries (DPI) and Local Land Services (LLS) are providing assistance to landholders and communities with animal welfare-related issues including:

- Animal assessment and veterinary assistance
- Stock euthanasia and burial
- Livestock feeding and management advice

Prepare now if you haven't already

In periods of very high fire danger rating, it is recommended that landholders keep up to date with Rural Fire Service advice. Ideally:

- livestock should be moved to an eaten-out paddock, irrigated pasture or bare yards with a cleared or ploughed perimeter
- horses should be transported off the property early or agisted if they can't be kept safe during a bushfire
- care should be taken with horses so they are not locked in an area where they may panic and hurt themselves. A large sand yard is suitable if there are no flammable buildings or vegetation nearby
- livestock should be easily identifiable in the event fences are destroyed and stock escape.

Landholders are encouraged to:

- keep an eye on the weather and be aware of fire bans and restrictions
- familiarise themselves with the Rural Fire Service's fire danger ratings and bushfire alert levels
- download useful apps, such MyFirePlan, Fires Near Me and Live Traffic NSW
- always phone triple zero when their life is at risk
